



**TACO 'BOUT A GOOD START:** Austin locals are always debating the town's best breakfast taco, and visitors should sample at least a few to find their own favorite. A worthy starting point is **Tacodeli**, founded here by Mexico City native Roberto Espinosa in 1999 and celebrating its first downtown restaurant opening this year on Congress Avenue. Order up Jamón El Suavecito, tender belly smoked ham with a mix of cheeses for a perfectly Austin start to your day. (512) 601-6631; tacodeli.com.

BOOK IT: A library might seem an unlikely mustsee spot, but **Austin Central** is no ordinary library. Named one of 100 World's Greatest Places by *Time* magazine in 2018, the six-floor library has earned high marks for green features, including rainwater-powered bathrooms and a seed library. Don't miss the rooftop garden, a technology "petting zoo" with 3D printers, and the **Cookbook Bar and Café.** (512) 974-7400; library.austintexas.gov.

**ENJOY THE FARE:** Austin has so many dining options that deciding where to eat can be overwhelming. All the more reason to check out **Fareground**, Austin's first food hall, located on Congress

Avenue and home to outposts of several of the city's hottest restaurants, including **Contigo**, **Henbit**, **Ni-Komé**, and **Dai Due Taqueria**. It makes for an easy DIY food crawl at lunch or dinner. *faregroundaustin.com*.

catch a Show: Choose your own musical adventure in Austin. Head to the Elephant Room (elephantroom.com) for jazz, Broken Spoke (brokenspokeaustintx.net) for country, Antone's (antonesnightclub.com) for blues, and the Cactus Café (cactuscafe.org) for acoustic singersongwriters. The granddaddy of Austin venues is the Continental Club (continentalclub.com), while the Austin City Limits stage at Moody Theater (acl-live.com) hosts major performers.

sleep Here: The East Austin Hotel, which opened in May, embraces a midcentury aesthetic with locally sourced vintage furnishings, and dozens of traditional rooms, as well as "cabins"—budgetfriendly private rooms with shared bathrooms. The hotel also has three on-site restaurants and bars. Rooms start at \$99. (737) 205-8888; eastaustinhotel.com. Feel like a splurge? Check out the new luxe Hotel ZaZa Austin. Rates start at \$289. 



## Day 2

BIKE THE COLORADO RIVER: Enjoy some Texas sunshine with a bike ride that spans the Colorado River's downtown stretch, which includes Lady Bird Lake and Zilker Park. Rent a bike at one of the many Austin B-cycle stations around town. Rates start at \$3. austinbcycle.com.

Then explore the 10-mile Ann and Roy Butler Hike-and-Bike Trail. tinyurl.com /austintrail. Once you get to Zilker Park, you can cool down with a dip at Barton Springs, where a spring-fed, 70-degree public pool is open year-round. Closed Thursdays. Nonresident adults, \$9.

'CUE-CRAWL: No Austin visit is complete without indulging in barbecue. A great choice is still Franklin Barbecue (franklinbbq.com), where waiting in line is a sacred tradition (think lawn chairs and beverages, tailgate-style). An explosion of worthy competitors has followed in recent years, many of them in East Austin. You can't go wrong at La Barbecue (labarbecue.com),

**Micklethwait Craft Meats** (craftmeats austin.com), or **J. Leonardi's Barbecue** (texasbbgaustin.com).

IN LIVING COLOR: See Austin, one of the most talked-about art installations of the past two years, by the late artist Ellsworth Kelly. Located at the Blanton Museum of Art on the University of Texas at Austin campus, Kelly's sparse chapel-like structure with colorful geometric shapes on three sides always looks different depending on the sun. blantonmuseum .org. While you're on campus, also check out James Turrell's The Color Inside, a skylight art installation best seen at sunrise or sunset. Free, reservation required. turrell.utexas.edu.

**ENJOY THE SHOW:** For a different kind of cinematic experience, head to **Blue Starlite Drive-In**, which shows classic films that moviegoers watch from the comfort of their car or lawn chair. *Tickets start at \$10. bluestarlitedrivein.com*.

## Day 3

GO BRUNCHING: Partake in the beloved Austin brunching tradition by reserving your spot on a bus or a boat. On the Brunch Bus by Twisted Texas Tours, a live band serenades you through three brunch spots. \$69; twistedtexastour.com. In November and December, join Buddy the Elf on an Austin Tour Company-led slow Brunch Boat to nowhere on Lady Bird Lake, featuring dancing on the top deck, tacos below, and plenty of giggles. \$49; austintourcompany.com.

TAKE A HIKE: To get a classic Hill Country view of Lake Austin, climb 106 steps up Mount Bonnell. After making your way down, check out Laguna Gloria, a 14-acre outdoor sculpture and art-installation park located just a mile away. (512) 458-8191. Consider buying picnic fixings at the new French-American café, Épicerie. (512) 371-6840; epicerieaustin.com.

BISCUITS, PLEASE: Treat yourself to an elevated Southern-style meal at **Olamaie**, featuring the culinary stylings of James Beard Award finalist Michael Fojtasek. Start with the Ranger Cattle Beef Tartare and off-the-menu biscuits with honey butter. Reservations recommended. (512) 474-2796; olamaieaustin.com.
